# 1. Scope

These course regulations apply to the following degree:

- Master of Fine Arts (Directing)

For students commencing in 2026.

# 2. Authority to award the qualification

On the recommendation of the NIDA Academic Board, the NIDA Board of Directors may confer the degree of Master of Fine Arts (Directing) on any person who completes this course of study in accordance with these regulations.

# 3. Graduate Attributes

NIDA graduates of MFA courses:

## 3.1. Knowledge and discipline expertise

Have deep discipline knowledge and expertise commensurate with the expectations of the relevant professional area within the arts and cultural sectors in Australia and internationally, and the capability to provide discipline leadership.

## 3.2. Critical and creative thinking

Have a high level ability to be creative and innovative with the capacity for analytical and critical thinking in a creative environment.

## 3.3. Realisation and application

Can confidently apply their skills and knowledge to create work, collaborate as part of a creative team, and provide leadership in a range of challenging and engaging contexts, productions and events.

## 3.4. Communication

Have a high level ability to interpret, communicate and present ideas, problems and arguments in ways appropriate to their discipline, audience and purpose using clear written and spoken expression, and appropriate technologies.

## 3.5. Individual and collaborative practice

Can work autonomously and collaboratively underpinned by an understanding of the scholarship of integration, together with a practical insight into and experience of each individual's role and responsibility in an interdisciplinary creative process.

## 3.6. Research

Have the ability to design, implement, document and disseminate research projects relevant to their discipline.

## 3.7. Social engagement

Act with integrity, contextualising their practice in response to social, cultural and ethical issues, and provide discipline leadership through discovery, innovation and broad creative thinking.

## 3.8. Lifelong learning

Are lifelong, self-directed learners with a curiosity for new ideas, innovative techniques, methodologies, practices and technology.

### 3.9. Enterprise skills

Have the professional and entrepreneurial skills to successfully instigate, manage and collaborate on creative projects in their own practice.

## 4. Course Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, graduates will be able to:

- 4.1. Confidently direct live theatre productions with expert embodied knowledge in preparation, structuring, rehearsing, and staging methodologies.
- 4.2. Transform and extend directing methodologies to engage with diverse artistic mediums that span live performance, screen, and digital media.
- 4.3. Demonstrate expert-level collaboration skills, built upon clear communication, emotional intelligence, empathetic leadership, and ideation practices.
- 4.4. Articulate a unique directorial voice and employable brand which showcases a clear sense of cultural context, social responsibility, personal politics, aesthetics, and creative potential.
- 4.5. Use practice based research skills to apply new insights into directing practice

## 5. Admission requirements

The following admission requirements apply:

## 6. Course requirements

### 6.1. Course structure

A minimum of 180 credit points drawn from the approved course structure is required in order for a student to graduate with the Master of Fine Arts (Directing) degree. The Master of Fine Arts (Directing) course comprises eleven (11) subjects, all of which are core. These are:

## 6.2. Industry placements

Industry placements are an option in this course. Students can undertake industry placements in semester 3.

## 6.3. Course duration

The Master of Fine Arts (Directing) is of 18 months' duration and is available only as a full-time course delivered face to face, barring exceptional circumstances.

## 6.4. Attendance

Students must attend every timetabled session for every subject, except in cases of certified medical conditions or when leave of absence has been formally approved in writing by the Course Leader (Directing). Failure to meet the attendance requirements could result in a fail result for any subject.

## 6.5. Rules of Progression

Students must complete all subjects within a given semester to progress to the next semester. There are no pre-requisites for any subject. Should a student receive a fail result for any subject, the Examination and Progress Committee will:

- determine if the student is able to repeat the subject. To repeat a subject, a student must enrol and pay the prescribed fee for the subject.
- determine whether the student may remain enrolled on non-standard progression. Non-standard progression occurs when a student is not enrolled in a full-time load and/or is undertaking a different combination of subjects in a given semester than prescribed in 6.1.

Should a student fail one or more of the following common subjects, they may be allowed to

repeat that subject/s when it is next offered (normally in the following year). In such an instance, a student may enroll in all subjects required for the semester other than those for which the previously failed subject is a pre-requisite.

Should a student fail one or more of the following discipline-specific subjects, they may be allowed to repeat that subject/s when it is next offered (normally in the following year). However, students must have passed all the required discipline-specific subjects as prescribed in any semester to be permitted to progress to the set of discipline-specific subjects in the subsequent semester. Students may continue to be enrolled in commons subjects without being enrolled in disciplinary specific subjects.

Should a student fail any subject twice, they will be required to show cause why their enrolment in the course should not be terminated.

The Director of Learning and Innovation can approve a student be placed on non-standard progression outside of an Examination and Progression Committee where this is not related to student failure of a subject. Any decisions made by the Director of Learning and Innovation for non-standard progression will be reported to the next meeting of the Examination and Progression Committee.

## 6.6. Extension of Time

The maximum period of candidature is 3 years (36 months). Deferrals and extensions beyond the minimum period for completion (18 months) are at the discretion of the Director of Learning and Innovation on the recommendation of the Course Leader (Directing).

Where a student requires a course extension beyond the maximum period of candidature, the matter will be dealt with in accordance with the Credit Transfer and Recognition of Prior Learning Policy (RPL), the Deferral, Suspension and Cancellation Policy and the Student Support and Academic Intervention Policy.

## 7. Credit

The processes for the granting of credit are governed by the NIDA Credit Transfer and Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) Policy. An application for credit must be submitted and approved prior to commencement of this course. A student may not be granted credit after the commencement of teaching of the course in which the student enrolls.

Credit will be approved by the Head of Academic Development and Research. Any Recognition of

Prior Learning or course credit for international students that impacts their course duration will be advised in advance of a Confirmation of Enrolment being issued. The Confirmation of Enrolment will reflect the shortened duration of the course.

## 8. Variations

In compassionate or compelling circumstances, the Academic Board or its representative may approve a personal program which does not conform to these regulations.

**End of regulations**
